**EDITOR'S NOTES:**

This advertisement for a humorous periodical uses the imagery of a daguerreotypist making a truthful image of his subject by the aid of the light of a lantern. The "Lantern of Diogenes" refers to Diogenes of Sinope, the philosopher who is said to have walked about Athens with a lantern in the daytime, looking for an honest man.

Although this graphic is not likely intended to depict an actual instance of the use of artificial light for daguerreian portraiture, John A. Whipple did experiment with the use of the Drummond light and exhibited three examples to the editor of the *Photographic Art-Journal*.<sup>1</sup>
